

REPORT OF THE STANDING FINANCE COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

on the Consideration of Proposals for the Variation of Appropriation for the fiscal year 2021

SECOND SESSION OF THE TWELFTH PARLIAMENT (2021/2022)

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Standing Finance Committee

The Standing Finance Committee was established under House of Representatives Standing Order 82(1) to consider the Estimates and the Appropriation Bill. House of Representatives Standing Order 87(1) also states that, "The Standing Finance Committee shall consider and report on all proposals for the expenditure from public revenue or other funds which are not included in the Annual Estimates, including proposals for supplementary and unforeseen expenditure."

Publication

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THE COMMITTEE

Mandate of the Committee

1. The Standing Finance Committee is established by House of Representatives Standing Order 82(1) of the House of Representatives Standing Orders. It is the duty of the Committee to consider the Estimates and the Appropriation Bill. The Committee is also empowered by House of Representatives Standing Order 87(1) to consider and report on all proposals for expenditure which are not included in the Annual Estimates including proposals for supplementary and unforeseen expenditure.

Membership

2. In accordance with the House of Representatives Standing Order 82(1), this Committee is a Committee of the Whole House of Representatives and is chaired by the Speaker.

Meeting

- 3. The Committee held a public meeting on Friday January 21, 2022 at 1:30 p.m. The Minutes of the Meeting and the Verbatim Notes are attached at Appendices II and III respectively.
- 4. The purpose of this meeting was to consider proposals for the variation of the appropriation provided in the Appropriation (Financial Year 2021) Act, 2020 and varied by the Finance (Supplementation and Variation of Appropriation) (Financial Year 2021) Act, 2021. The Schedule relating to the variation of estimates for fiscal 2021 is at Appendix IV.

Variation

- 5. The increases and decreases in the Appropriation for the fiscal year 2021 reflect the re-allocation of funds to retire advances from the Treasury Deposits.
- 6. The Committee noted that it was necessary to have a Variation of the Appropriation of resources in the sum of Five Hundred and Seventy-Four Million, Eight Hundred and Eighty Nine Thousand, Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$574,889,840) to bring to account expenditure funded by advances from the Treasury Deposits for payments made under the following Heads of Expenditure:

03 - Judiciary - for telephone and security services as well as for the

rental of office accommodation

17 - Personnel Department - for the rental of office accommodation; renewal of a

software license as well as janitorial and consultancy

services

78 - Ministry of Social

- for senior citizens pensions and social assistance

Development and Family

disability grants

Services

7. The Standing Finance Committee noted savings in fiscal 2021 identified under the Ministry of Finance in the sum of \$574,889,840.

Write-offs

- 8. The Standing Finance Committee considered and approved write-offs in the sum of Eight Million Two Hundred and Eighteen Thousand, Six Hundred and Fifty -Three Dollars and Ninety- One Cents (\$8,218,653.91):
 - The write-off of Audit Fees and the associated Value Added Tax (VAT) totalling
 One Million Four Hundred and Ninety-Eight Thousand, Six Hundred and Sixty-

- Six Dollars and One Cent (\$1,498,666.01) due and uncollectible in respect of 'Contribution for the Audit of Accounts' by the Auditor General Department.
- The write-off of the overpayment of Salaries and Cost of Living Allowance totalling One Million Three Hundred and Thirty Thousand, Six Hundred and Fifty-Six Dollars and Seventy-Four Cents (\$1,330,656.74) to 178 Teachers of the Ministry of Education consequent on the Implementation of the Classification and Compensation Plan for the Teaching Service for the period January 1st, 1999 to September 30, 2002.
- The write-off of outstanding amount owed to Evolving Tecknologies and Enterprises Development Company Limited (e-Teck) by InvesTT Limited (InvesTT) in the sum of Five Million Three Hundred and Eighty-Nine Thousand, Three Hundred and Thirty-One Dollars and Sixteen Cents (\$5,389,331.16) which represents financial support provided by e-TecK to InvestTT during the period April 2014 to May 2017.

Transfers

- 9. The Standing Finance Committee noted that the Minister of Finance approved the transfer of funds in the sum of:
 - One Billion Two Hundred and Seventy-Five Million, Five Hundred and Forty-Five Thousand and One Hundred and Seventy-Seven Dollars (\$1,275,545,177.00) between Sub-heads under the same Head of Expenditure for fiscal 2020 (see Appendix IV).
 - One Billion One Hundred and Sixteen Million, Nine Hundred and Thirty-Nine Thousand and Four Hundred and Fifty-Nine Dollars (\$1,116,939,459.00) between Sub-heads under the same Head of Expenditure for fiscal 2021 (see Appendix IV).
- 10. The transfers were approved by the Minister based on Notes from the respective Ministries requesting transfers between Sub-Heads and reflect changed circumstances in Ministries and Departments and a consequential re-ordering of priorities.

Summary of Changes to Heads of Expenditure

11. The Standing Finance Committee considered and approved a Variation to the Appropriation for fiscal year 2021 in the sum of Five Hundred and Seventy-Four Million, Eight Hundred and Eighty-Nine Thousand, Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars (\$574,889,840). The details of Variation are provided in Table 1 and Appendix IV.

- 1.1 The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m.
- 1.2 The Chairman indicated that in accordance with Standing Order 82 (6) and 87, a meeting of the Standing Finance Committee was convened to consider proposals for the Variation of Appropriation for the fiscal year 2021.
- 1.3 Members were advised that in accordance with Standing Order 45(1) the speaking time in Standing Finance Committee shall not exceed five (5) minutes on each intervention.
- 1.4 The procedure for the consideration of the Heads of Expenditure was outlined.

TRANSFERS

2.1 The Committee noted that the Minister of Finance approved the transfer of funds in the sum of \$1, 275,545,177 between Sub-Heads under the same Head of Expenditure for fiscal year 2020 and the transfer of funds in the sum of \$1,116,939,459 between Sub-Heads under the same Head of Expenditure for fiscal year 2021. These transfers reflect changed circumstances in Ministries and Departments and a consequential re-ordering of priorities.

PROPOSALS FOR THE VARIATION OF APPROPRIATION FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2021

Head 18: Ministry of Finance - Decrease

- 3.1 The Chairman announced Head 18, Ministry of Finance, a decrease in the sum of \$574,889,840.00.
- 3.2 The Minister of Finance was invited to make a brief opening statement for less than five (5) minutes.
- 3.3 The Chairman proposed the question that Head 18, Ministry of Finance be varied by a decrease in the sum of \$574,889,840.00.
- 3.4 The Members for Oropouche West, Pointe-a-Pierre, Princes Town and Barataria/ San Juan sought clarification from the Minister. Thereafter the Minister of Finance provided an explanation for the decrease.
- 3.5 The question was put and agreed that Head 18, Ministry of Finance be varied by a decrease in the sum of \$574,889,840.00.

3.6 The question was put and agreed that the Appropriation for fiscal year 2021 be varied by a total decrease of \$574,889,840.00.

- 4.2 The Minister of Social Development and Family Services was invited to make a brief opening statement for less than five (5) minutes.
- 4.3 The Members for Chaguanas East, Barataria/ San Juan and Princes Town sought clarification from the Minister. Thereafter the Minister of Social Development and Family Services provided an explanation for the increase.
- 4.4 The Chairman proposed the question that Head 78, Ministry of Social Development and Family Services to be varied by an increase in the sum of \$531,053,225.00.
- 4.5 The question was put and agreed that Head 78, Ministry of Social Development and Family Services to be varied by an increase in the sum of \$531,053,225.00.

Head 03: Judiciary - Increase

- 5.1 The Chairman announced Head 03, Judiciary, an increase in the sum of \$35,195,944.00.
- 5.2 The Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs was invited to make a brief opening statement for a maximum of five (5) minutes.
- 5.3 The Chairman proposed the question that Head 03, Judiciary be varied by an increase in the sum of \$35,195,944.00.
- 5.4 The Member for Barataria/San Juan sought clarification from the Attorney General. Thereafter the Attorney General provided an explanation for the increase.
- 5.5 The question was put and agreed that Head 03, Judiciary be varied by an increase in the sum of \$35,195,944.00.

Head 17: Personnel Department - Increase

- 6.1 The Chairman announced Head 17, Personnel Department, an increase in the sum of \$8,640,671.00.
- 6.2 The Minister of Public Administration was invited to make a brief opening statement for less than five (5) minutes.
- 6.3 The Chairman proposed the question that Head 17, Personnel Department be varied by an increase in the sum of \$8,640,671.00.

APPENDIX III Verbatim Notes

VERBATIM NOTES OF THE STANDING FINANCE COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES HELD ON FRIDAY, JANUARY 21, 2022 AT 1.30 P.M.

Madam Chairman: I now call to order this meeting of the Standing Finance Committee.

Hon. Members, in accordance with Standing Orders 82(6) and 87, this meeting of the Standing Finance Committee was convened to consider proposals for the variation of appropriation for fiscal year 2021. Hon. Members, in accordance with Standing Order 45(1), the speaking time in Standing Finance Committee shall not exceed five minutes on each intervention. The proposals for variation decreases will be considered first, then proposals for variation increases, and thereafter the proposals for write-off of losses for fiscal year 2020.

The procedure we shall adopt is as follows.

- 1. The Head and the amount to be varied will be announced;
- 2. The Minister with responsibility will then be invited to explain the purpose for the variation;
- 3. I will then propose the question that the Head be varied;
- 4. Members may then seek clarification from the Minister;
- 5. Once this is concluded the Chairman will then put the question that the sum to be varied be approved;
- 6. The procedure will be repeated for each Head;
- 7. A similar procedure will be followed for the approval of the write-off of losses;
- 8. The Committee is being asked to note that the Minister of Finance has approved the transfer of funds in the sum of \$1,275,545,177 between Sub-Heads under same of Head of Expenditure for fiscal year 2020, and the transfer of funds in the sum of \$1,116,939,459 between Sub-Heads under the same Head of Expenditure for fiscal year 2021. These transfers do not require the approval of the Committee.

Variation: Hon. Members, we shall now consider the proposal for the variation for fiscal year 2021. The proposal for decreases will be considered first, followed by the proposals for increases.

Decreases: Hon. Members, we shall now consider the proposal for decreases for fiscal year 2021.

Head 18: Ministry of Finance \$574,889,840.

Madam Chairman: I now invite the Minister of Finance to make a brief opening statement for a maximum of five minutes.

Hon. Imbert: Thank you, Madam Chairman. We did not do this in a previous year because there were no variations between Heads and in those circumstances it is not required to come to Parliament to do a variation of appropriation Bill. You can vary within a Head. So that if there are various Items and Sub-Items within a Head—and a Head is a Ministry or Department—you can vary within those Heads and you do not have to come and seek parliamentary approval to do that. But, once you are moving from one Head to another you have to seek parliamentary approval by way of the procedures, the Standing Finance Committee, and then a debate on the variation of appropriation Bill.

This year, we had to put some more funds into three Departments and we took them from the Ministry of Finance because at the end of the fiscal year we were able to establish a number of savings in the Ministry of Finance Head, and I will go through them; contributions to the Caribbean Development Bank; Government Assistance for Tuition Expenses, we pay the GATE expenses; funding for the Agricultural Development Bank; funding for the Mortgage Finance Company, for a company that is no longer functioning; the community and programme services; funding for

UDeCOTT; and funds for eTecK. All of these funds were not required during the fiscal year so we were able to generate savings there and then send those savings to the Judiciary, the Personnel Department and the Ministry of Social Development and Family Services for urgently needed expenditure. Okay?

Question proposed: That Head 18 be varied by a decrease in the sum of \$574,889,840.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, I note that the Member has—the Minister, the hon. Minister of Finance, has indicated that his Ministry was able to generate savings under these various Headings here, however, in reviewing them, I have noted that these are not in fact savings. In several occasions under several of these Sub-Heads, the Ministry in fact did not provide sufficient funding to these Heads and as a result of that these are not necessarily savings. I would want to go to Sub-Head—to Item 04/001/01, Contribution to the Caribbean Development Bank, and ask the Minister if he could provide some clarification as to why this money was not allocated. A note says it was not requested but is this money a continuous debt? Is it that we would have to pay this, Minister—is it that we would have to pay this for 2021 in a subsequent financial year, maybe 2022?

Hon. Imbert: Madam Chairman, that contribution from the hon. Member made absolutely no sense. The Member started off by saying these are not savings and in fact there was no allocation provided for the various Items that I read out. That is totally untrue. They are all — [Interruption]

Mr. Tancoo: I think you are misquoting me, Sir. I think you are absolutely misquoting me –

Hon. Imbert: Madam Chairman, I did not say anything when he spoke.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West –

Hon. Member: Shhh. **Hon. Imbert:** Not a word.

Madam Chairman: One minute, please. Okay? Certain behaviour here is not acceptable so we would not be "shooing". Member for Oropouche West, you were allowed an intervention, you made use of your intervention; you have asked a question also and the Minister is now responding. He is entitled to in his response, not just to the question but to give his version, according to him, a correction of certain things that have been placed on the record. And I hope we will all respect each other in this process and allow people to answer. Minister of Finance.

Hon. Imbert: Madam Chairman, I want to repeat, I did not say a word when the Member was speaking, although I wanted to. So let me just repeat. The Member said these are not savings because there was no allocation made for them; that is completely wrong. There can only be transfers by definition if you are transferring from an allocation to another Head. If there was nothing to transfer, a transfer could not occur and therefore there was an allocation for the Caribbean Development Bank and it was not utilized during the fiscal year and was therefore available for a transfer.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

1.40 p.m.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you. Ma'am, my question was to the hon. Minister whether this remains a debt that we will have to pay in 2022 or any future point in time.

Hon. Imbert: Madam Chairman, I am advised that we took responsibility for the obligation, and we made appropriate arrangements with the Caribbean Development Bank and therefore, this expenditure was not required.

Madam Chairman: Member for Pointe-a-Pierre.

Mr. Lee: Thank you, Madam Chair. Minister, line Item 04/011/23: Agricultural Development Bank, \$25 million. Minister, the ADB plays a very important role to the country in respect of food security. This funding that was not disbursed because, according to the note here, was less than the amount allocated for the period. Could the Minister expand, given the whole thrust in agriculture, why the ADB did not request this \$25 million, or why this \$25 million was not sent to them?

Hon. Imbert: Certainly. This funding is made available to the Agricultural Development Bank by the Ministry of Finance in order to give the ADB sufficient funds, sufficient capital so they can onlend to their customers. During that fiscal year, I do not want to speculate, it could be as a result of COVID, I cannot say, but the request made to the ADB and the request from the ADB to the Ministry of Finance for this capital injection for unlending was lower than anticipated. These are all estimates, you see. So based on previous years records and projections and strategic plan of the ADB, they gave us an amount that they would like us to have available to them, to on-lend to their customers. But for one reason or the other, their customers did not request or did not meet the criteria, or for whatever reason, the ADB did not need the funds during the fiscal year. Okay?

Madam Chairman: Member for Chaguanas East.

Ms. Mohit: Madam Chair, we are on decreases. I will go on when we are on increases.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: 04/009/17: Government Assistance for Tuition Expenses Fund, GATE. Could the hon. Minister indicate that in the fiscal 2020, how many persons accessed GATE funding, seeing that there seems to be a balance that is being utilized?

Hon. Imbert: You have a rolling fund. So you have a pool of funds which is topped up and replenished from time to time. In fact, every year we inherit a balance in the GATE fund that goes forward to the next year, and then we inject funds into the GATE fund. I will get for you—I do not have those details, but I will get for you—it is the number of persons you wanted? What exactly do you want?

Mr. Padarath: To have been able to access this funding?

Hon. Imbert: Certainly, I will get that for you. **Madam Chairman:** Member for Pointe-a-Pierre.

Mr. Lee: Thank you, Madam Chair. Minister, just to follow up from Princes Town on the same line Item on GATE, the 80 million. Given that, to use your words, there is a saving of 80 million, would it be reflected in, let us say, your budget allocation going forward, that you feel that based on the means test and et cetera, that the funding that would be required would be less by \$80 million rolling forward?

Hon. Imbert: It is not as simple as that. Let us say we start off the year with a credit balance in the GATE fund of \$100 million, and then we appropriate \$500 million, so that the total funds available would be 600 million, and then it is drawn down from that. So it is based on requests coming in from the tertiary institutions to the Ministry of Education. They have to be audited, they have to be checked, and then they make the request to Finance. It comes to the Minister and the Minister will approve. I do this from time to time. I would get a file where everybody has done all of the checks that they have to do, and they certify this amount is now due to all of these institutions, 100 million or whatever it is, and then we will disburse.

So that, what would have happened in this fiscal year, is that the anticipated expenditure was less than actually occurred, but that would just continue to roll over into the next fiscal year. **Madam Chairman:** Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, Madam Chair. Line Item 04/001/26, can the Minister advise why it is that the amount of funding allocated is \$50 million less than the amount actually disbursed?

Madam Chairman: Minister.

Hon. Imbert: The money allocated to the TTMF is for the subsidy on mortgage loans that successive governments have given for many, many, many years. The way the TTMF arrangement is structured, they give loans at a rate of 2 per cent and 5 per cent, based on the amount of the loan and other criteria. This is for public housing. It is almost impossible to predict the number of mortgages that will be finalized during a fiscal year, for all sorts of reasons. You are dealing with processing of title, persons may be a little slow — this is the actual applicants themselves — may be a little slow in providing all of their necessary documents, bank statements, whatever it is.

So that at the beginning of the year, the Ministry of Finance would make an estimate on the level of subsidy it has to provide to the TTMF because the actual mortgage rate is higher than that. If you go to a private bank, you would not get a mortgage for 2 per cent. You might get it for 6 per cent, or whatever. So the Government makes up the difference in the cost of that interest. So that there are a huge number of factors that come to bear on the disbursement from the Ministry of Finance to the TTMF to make up that subsidy; completion of houses, as I said, title deeds, preparedness of the applicants and so on. So we make an estimate, it is a best estimate, but what happened in this fiscal is that at the end of the year the amount requested from TTMF was \$50 million less than what was appropriated.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Thank you, Madam. Hon. Minister, just to follow up with respect to the same GATE issue, based on the answer that you provided. Can you indicate whether in 2020, compared to the year before, there would have been a reduction in the number of institutions that are GATE funded?

Madam Chairman: When you are asking in terms of the year before, you are talking 2019?

Mr. Padarath: A comparison, Madam.

Madam Chairman: No, I will not allow that, Member for Princes Town, under this exercise. Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just to refer back to 04/001/26, the TTMF. Can the Minister confirm that this reduction in allocation has not impacted on the ability of TTMF to offer the services to others, so that no citizen who applied for a loan was deprived of this mortgage, because they had not sufficient funds at TTMF?

Madam Chairman: Minister of Finance.

Hon. Imbert: I think there is a little mix up there, Madam Chairman. Firstly, this is not a reduction in allocation. This is a reduction in expenditure. There was an allocation based on the best estimate of what would be required. We in Finance continue to give TTMF money on a continuous basis as and when they request it.

Mr. Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Can the Minister then confirm that no applicant for a TTMF mortgage was denied access to funding, because this amount of money was not provided, it was not disbursed to the TTMF?

Hon. Imbert: Madam Chairman, I do not think the Member understands. We in Finance disburse money when requested. We do not handle mortgages.

Madam Chairman: Member for Pointe-a-Pierre.

Mr. Lee: Thank you, Madam Chair. Minister, line Item on the Community Improvement Services Limited, \$14.8 million. On operational cost reduction, Minister, could you state out of that 14.8 million, how much of that operational cost relates to salaries?

Hon. Imbert: Well, let me first explain what the bulk of this money is. This is for a judgment. So there was an anticipation that there would be a judgment cost to pay during the fiscal, by September 30th. That did not happen, and this is why this money occurred.

Mr. Lee: [Inaudible]

Hon. Imbert: They would have a skeleton crew in that company. It is one of these companies that was being wound up.

Mr. Lee: Okay.

Madam Chairman: Member for Barataria/San Juan.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. Minister, I just want to take you back on the line Item with the TTMF. You said, basically, the Ministry would estimate how many persons may have applied, or how many houses would be built, so those persons that access the mortgages from TTMF—with this movement of this \$50 million, it meant that this money was not given to TTMF. Can you just give us an indication of how many persons may not have been able to access these services, due to the fact that you can save this \$50 million as you said?

1.50 p.m.

Hon. Imbert: Okay. Madam Chairman, the Member for Barataria/San Juan is falling into the same

error as the Member for Oropouche West. The Ministry of Finance does not manage the TTMF. TTMF is, in fact, reports to—does in fact report to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development, so we do not get involved in those matters. What would happen is that, in the budget cycle because the budget cycle starts around April or May and then goes into June, July, September, August and so on and that is when we settle the numbers. So during the budget cycle, the Budget Division would have made a request of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development to TTMF to tell us, what do you expect to request from the Ministry of Finance to subsidize the mortgages and an allocation would have been made. So we just deal with funding a request coming from TTMF but we do not get into all of those—

Mr. Hosein: So this figure –

Hon. Imbert: – that is really – I can get the information for you. I will give you that undertaking.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you.

Hon. Imbert: But I am just trying to explain that we in the Ministry of Finance do not manage TTMF.

Mr. Hosein: And this figure will represent that was a decrease in the number mortgages basically for that fiscal year?

Hon. Imbert: I cannot answer that. I am going to repeat that it is not for the Minister of Finance to give you those details —

Mr. Hosein: Sure.

Hon. Imbert: — off the cuff because TTMF does not report to us. We do not have that information.

Mr. Hosein: Sure.

Hon. Imbert: But I will get it. **Mr. Hosein:** Thank you very much.

Hon. Imbert: Okay? Right.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Thank you, Ma'am. Minister, line Item 07/011/22 eTecK. One of eTecK's loans for 160 million would have matured—in terms of the payment, sorry. In 2021 there was an allocation for a final payment on this loan however, the Cabinet chose to refinance the loan. Can you give us an indication of what was the purpose of refinancing as opposed to settling this 160 million?

Madam Chairman: Minister of Finance.

Hon. Imbert: Yes, Member. When we in the Ministry of Finance look at our debt profile and our debt servicing programme and the maturation of debts over the years, we adopt all sorts of strategies. In some cases, we pay off a debt when it becomes due. In some cases, we renegotiate. In some cases, we refinance. In this particular case, at the beginning of the fiscal year the plan was to pay off the debt as it became due. But we made a decision based on evolving circumstances to refinance it. So we refinanced it by borrowing an amount from another institution and therefore it was not necessary to make this payment during this fiscal year.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Minister, can you indicate, what was the initial reason for this 160 million loan to eTeck?

Hon. Imbert: Well, as I said, at the beginning of the year we have a debt management strategy. So as I said, we would know what loans are maturing during the fiscal and we would have a plan, a debt management plan in October and it would be a combination of things. Some debts you would refinance. Some debts you will pay off. So it depends on the level of the debt at the particular time. It depends on cash flow because in order to pay this 160 million we would have need to have a 160 million available in cash flow. So as we came closer to the date, we decided rather than use a 160 million of our cash flow which is what you need for appropriations to all Ministries, we decided instead to refinance. So it is just one of those things that happened during the year.

The debt management plan at the beginning is not cast in stone, it is based on your best understanding of circumstances. But as you go along you may make a decision to refinance rather than pay off. That happens to us every week. Every week we have to make decisions like that.

Sometimes you pay them off, if we have cash flow. When cash flow is tight, we refinance.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, Madam Chairman. On the same Sub-Head 07/001/22, can the Minister advise the additional cost to the taxpayer of refinancing this loan?

Hon. Imbert: I will not be able to give you those details. I will give you an undertaking to see what is the effect of refinancing.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Madam, I did not get from the hon. Minister on the last occasion when he responded to me. Basically the question was, this loan was given to eTecK, what specific project this loan financed? And that was thrust really of the question.

Hon. Imbert: Let me see if the public servants can answer that. Hold on. It is believed that it was for hotel development but I will get the exact details for you. Okay?

Madam Chairman: Member for Barataria/San Juan.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much. Minister, with respect to the UDeCOTT line Item, also that loan was it for a specific project also? The loan that was refinanced.

Hon. Imbert: Yes. Refinanced. **Mr. Hosein:** What project?

Hon. Imbert: A number of different projects.

Mr. Hosein: Okay. So it is just based on some of the —

Hon. Imbert: It is a block. It is a block loan made to UDeCOTT for a variety of projects. **Mr. Hosein:** Okay. And it is the same reason that you would have given for eTecK —

Hon. Imbert: When I look cash flow, you know, sometimes the overdraft is right up close to 100 per cent. Other times it is at 70 per cent, 60 per cent, 80 per cent. So it just depends on the cash flow needs at that point in time, as we approach the maturation of the loan, we make a decision whether to refinance or use those funds to pay it off.

Mr. Hosein: Minister, is it—which financial institution was the loan refinanced with?

Hon. Imbert: I will get that information for you.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: The same question as before with regard to this UDeCOTT loan, Madam Chair.

Madam Chairman: Member, can you speak into the mike? I am sorry.

Mr. Tancoo: Sure.

Madam Chairman: With the mask and everything, it is muffled. I am sorry.

Mr. Tancoo: Sure, Madam Chair. The same Sub-Head UDeCOTT. If the Minister will also agree to provide the additional cost to the taxpayer for refinancing this loan?

Hon. Imbert: I have given an undertaking to indicate what is the effect because you have to understand that if we use cash we are, in fact, using the overdraft which may have a higher interest rate associated with it than a loan because the overdraft is not free. The Central Bank charges the Government the repo rate for the overdraft. So I will look at what the effect of refinancing is rather than get into your version of language.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, again, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, I noticed that the alleged saving from the Ministry with regard to UDeCOTT is 230 million. But it was a saving based on a refinancing of UDeCOTT \$230.1 million. Is that a typo in the agenda item here?

Hon. Imbert: I think we could have handled the .1. It is only a .1. That is only 100,000. So I am sure that we were able to handle the 100,000 and refinance the 230.

Question put and agreed to.

Head 18 varied by a decrease in the sum of \$574,889,840.

Madam Chairman: Thank you, Minister of Finance. Thank you, Permanent Secretary, Comptroller of Accounts and the representatives of the Ministry of Finance.

2.00 p.m.

Madam Chairman: Members, we now go to increases, and it has been agreed that we will take the Ministry of Social Development and Family Services first.

Head 78: Ministry of Social Development and Family Services – I will just await the technical people coming to assist you, Minister.

Head 78: Ministry of Social Development and Family Services \$531,053,225.

Madam Chairman: I will now invite the Minister of Social Development and Family Services to make a brief opening statement for a minimum of five minutes. Minister.

Hon. Cox: Thank you, Madam Chair. The Ministry of Social Development and Family Services continues to effectively carry out its mandate of maintaining the nation's safety net, including the provision of support provided to mitigate the COVID-19 measures. Madam Chair, the Supplementation and Variation of Appropriation for the fiscal year, 2021 emanated from the additional expenditure related to COVID-19 social support grants, phase two, in the sum of \$40 million. Additional funding was also required to meet expenses related to the three majority grants, namely, the Senior Citizens Pension, Disability Assistance Grant and Public Assistance Grant in the sum of \$548 million. The Ministry remains resolute in the delivery of a responsive and multifaceted social service system, caring for and the protection of our poor as vulnerable families from the multidimensional impacts of poverty are areas of focus as we invest in the development of the people needing it the most.

Question proposed: That Head 78 be varied by an increase in the sum of \$531,053,225.

Madam Chairman: Member for Chaguanas East.

Ms. Mohit: Thank you, Madam Chair, and Madam Chair, at this time I will just like to seek some clarification, and based on the Minister's opening statement, under Head 78, Ministry of Social Development and Family Services, where it says "For Senior Citizens Pension and Social Assistance Disability Grants". I had some concerns with that, but based on what the Minister just said, public assistance, so therefore I think there is an error there, since Social Assistance will refer to Public Assistance, so it worded as one. So therefore, it is three grants being referred to on the actual Item No. 1.

Hon. Cox: Yes.

Ms. Mohit: So I think that would need to be corrected.

Hon. Cox: Public Assistance, Disability and Senior Citizens.

Ms. Mohit: Thank you, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, can the Minister indicate to the Committee the proposed expenditures for — listed under these three Items, Senior Citizens Pension, Disability Assistance Grant and Public Assistance Grant based on this increase?

Hon. Cox: Senior Citizens Grant, 418,315,156; Social Assistance, 13,108,970 and Disability Grant, 99,629,099, which amounted to 531 million.

Ms. Mohit: Thank you. Madam Chair, I have a few questions if you would permit me? Madam Chair, given that—bearing in mind that these services are established services of the Ministry of Social Development and Family Services, why was this placed on the back burner, if I may say, in terms of effecting payments to cause it to lead to this increase stated, 531 million?

Hon. Cox: This was not placed on the back burner. This was to address a shortfall. And you would know that our grants, our applications and so on increase over time.

Ms. Mohit: Madam Chair, if you would permit me? Can the Minister state for us whether based on her reports in previous SFCs as well as the Ministry's administrative report, whether the delays in determination of matter or applications in terms of Senior Citizens Pension, Disability Grants and Public Assistance would have caused this—these applications to be, the delays in these applications would have caused you to have to request this increase?

Hon. Cox: This has nothing to do with increase in application. Actually, we have always paid these grants – these are our core grants – on time.

Ms. Mohit: Madam Chair, based on the Minister's reporting 2,000-plus persons under Senior Citizens Pension would have been delayed in this fiscal year, at the end of this fiscal year 2021 due to the lack of investigation and approval. So I am asking the Minister if these delays under the

Senior Citizens, in addition to that, Disability and Public Assistance, would have amounted to this sum of money as well?

Hon. Cox: No, this has nothing to do with money.

Madam Chairman: I think that question was asked and answered. I believe that question was asked and answered, Member for Chaguanas East, so maybe you can go on to another question if you have.

Ms. Mohit: Sure. Madam Chair, in light of what the Minister just stated, I am just seeking some clarification on whether allocations to follow would be sufficient the meet all the expenditure for these particular grant?

Hon. Cox: Well, at this time we are now assessing our needs.

Ms. Mohit: Madam Chair, could the Minister repeat? I did not hear.

Hon. Cox: We are now assessing it to determine if we would need any other increase in this fiscal. **Madam Chairman:** Member for Barataria/San Juan.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. Minister, with these increases that you would have disaggregated on the three grants, can you give us the total expenditure for 2021 for each of the grants with the additional variation?

Hon. Cox: For the Senior Citizens Grant, total expenditure, \$4,236,563,400.33.

Mr. Hosein: Four billion, two thirty seven million —

Hon. Cox: Two thirty six, five sixty three, four thirty three. Social Assistance \$353,121,459; Disability—you ready?—\$622,603,199.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Thank you, Madam Chair. Hon. Minister, one of the things you indicated a short while ago was that in this last financial year you saw increases in terms of applications and persons coming on to the Ministry with respect to the various grants. With respect to the Senior Citizens, the Disability and the other grants, would you be able to tell us this year by how much these increases were in terms of the persons who are actually registered with the Ministry who are now eligible for these grants, one? And, well, let us go with that first, sorry.

Hon. Cox: One hundred and eight thousand, seven hundred and sixteen senior citizens pensioners.

Mr. Padarath: On the Ministry's registry as of now?

Hon. Cox: Yes, as of now.

Mr. Padarath: And during this last financial year that we are dealing with, out of that 108-plus thousand, how many of those were new for this financial year?

2.10 p.m.

Madam Chairman: 2022?

Mr. Padarath: No Ma'am, with respect to the figures that we are dealing with for this —

Madam Chairman: You are saying this financial. Which financial?

Mr. Padarath: I am speaking within the context of what we are dealing with right now which is 2020 to 2021.

Madam Chairman: Yes, okay, right. Sen. Cox: The increase in 2021? Mr. Padarath: Yes, Ma'am.

Sen. Cox: Okay. Two thousand, eight hundred and seventy-six persons.

Mr. Padarath: That is senior citizens?

Sen. Cox: Yes.

Mr. Padarath: Can you give us for the others, please? Can you share with us for the disability and the other grants?

Sen. Cox: Okay. Disability, 572 persons; for social/public assistance, 757.

Madam Chairman: Member for Princes Town.

Mr. Padarath: Thank you, Ma'am. Hon. Minister, can you indicate in light of these increases whether or not there was a review of the criteria for persons to come on board with respect to these

new intakes?

Sen. Cox: I think on the whole there is a review of not just to come on board, there is a review of the grants taking place at this time.

Mr. Padarath: Okay, but the criteria that was utilized for these numbers that you just shared with us would have been what existed with the Ministry before or would it have been based on a review of the criteria?

Sen. Cox: I am not hearing you clearly.

Mr. Padarath: The question that I am asking is, these new intakes for this financial year of 2020 to 2021 –

Sen. Cox: Yes.

Mr. Padarath: — was it that these new intakes were based on an existing criteria or was it that there was a review of the criteria for these new persons to come on board?

Sen. Cox: These were based on the existing criteria.

Mr. Padarath: And now you are sharing with us that there is a review?

Sen. Cox: Okay, yes.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.
Mr. Tancoo: Asked and answered already. Thank you.
Madam Chairman: Okay. Member for Barataria/San Juan.

Mr. Hosein: Same, asked and answered.

Madam Chairman: Member for Chaguanas East.

Ms. Mohit: Madam Chair, Minister, can you state as a result of COVID-19 how many pensioners would have been removed from the system during this fiscal year being related to, 2021.

Sen. Cox: We would not be able to answer that because we do not deal with the cause of death. That would be from the Ministry of Health.

Question put and agreed to.

Head 78 varied by an increase in the sum of \$531,053,225.

Madam Chairman: I thank the Minister of Social Development and Family Services and the PS in that Ministry.

Head 03: Judiciary \$35,195,944.

Hon. Al-Rawi: Madam Chair, we have the technocrats from the Judiciary here.

Madam Chairman: Yeah. We are just allowing the Minister of Social Development and Family Services to leave the Chamber.

Madam Chairman: I will now invite the Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs to make a brief opening statement for a maximum of five minutes. Attorney General.

Hon. Al-Rawi: Thank you, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, I am pleased to inform that the matters before us now were signaled even at the start of last year's position. We did indicate in the context of COVID that we would have several adjustments to be made, because things were, to use the phrase, in flux. With that said, Madam Chairman, whilst the Judiciary did engage in viring funds well within its permit to do so, in bringing these matters to a close we were able to of course now state the subject heads that we have dealt with.

With respect to the variation of appropriation, 22,622,000-odd stands in respect of the concept of security. We had insufficient funds as we indicated in that flux statement at the beginning of the appropriation Bill for that cycle, to pay for contract salaries and licensing committees in fiscal 2021. What we did is we used funds in the Security Vote to address the shortfall and our shortfall, we are therefore now treating with in that security vote. Of course, this is across a number of buildings, across Trinidad and Tobago there are approximately 39 buildings that we are treating with, 22 in Trinidad and 17 in Tobago.

We are also dealing with a separate item, that is, the provision of funding in respect of the line Item for telephones. As you know during the COVID pandemic our telephony and ISP arrangements are critical in the virtual environment that we function very successfully in and I think the Judiciary is to be openly complimented for having withstood in an environment of a

pandemic in the manner that it did. That tag Item is approximately \$6 million.

We had rental accommodation and storage, again we had flagged early that we would need to treat with insufficiency of funds to meet rental accommodations for courts. We have for the 39 buildings, 22 in Trinidad and 17 in Tobago, we had to treat with a shortfall of approximately 7.592. By the time we made certain adjustments we got that figure down to 6.5 million. The transfers, of course, are standard. We had transfers moving from areas of surplus into areas of savings. Those were to the tune of \$2.6 million and the reasons for transfers are quite innocuous. We were dealing with the gratuity to certain persons, there were 93 persons and the gratuity calculations were not yet in order. And we also had some savings in respect of the preparation for payments on a loan facility for UDeCOTT as we were arranging our affairs in the move to the Waterfront courts which in fact we have already partially occupied.

I have taken the liberty, Madam Chair, to address a number of issues which I expect to come by way of questions if Members have, hoping to have satisfied them beforehand rather than in the course of questioning. I make myself open with the assistance of the Judiciary team here to answer any questions that Members may have.

Question proposed: That Head 03 be varied by an increase in the sum \$35,195,944.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. AG, you mentioned some transfers in terms of gratuity. Can you just give us the figure for the gratuity payment? Is it 92 officers you mentioned? **Hon. Al-Rawi:** Yes, please, it is 93 persons and the amount is 5,684,259. We had received an allocation of 4,588,100. So the shortfall was 1,096,159. That is the spread of persons and specific numbers.

Mr. Hosein: That Head was only really varied by 1.9?

Hon. Al-Rawi: Yes.

Mr. Hosein: With respect to the telephone services, I saw that on the Revised Estimate there was an allocation of 7 million for Trinidad and \$150,000 in Tobago. AG, can you just give us an indication whether this telephone bill also includes the Internet and other services that the Judiciary took on board with respect to the establishments of the virtual courts?

2.20 p.m.

Hon. Al-Rawi: Yes it does. It includes the suite of services.

Mr. Hosein: Okay. And with respect to the line Item with respect to rent in the sum of 6.5 million which court is that, or administrative building that the Judiciary will now be occupying? Is it a new building they occupied or is it existing arrears?

Madam Chairman: You are referring to something, Member for Barataria/San Juan, that I am not sure what is the source in that what is before us and not the transfers within the Head. Okay? So this detail that you are referring to, I am not sure what is the document. Yes?

Mr. Hosein: Can I, Madam Chair? While the AG was giving his opening statement he disaggregated where the 35 million was and he said that 6.5 of that would have been allocated to rent. So I am asking in that context.

Madam Chairman: Okay. Yes.

Hon. Al-Rawi: Madam Chair, I was going to say that I was the cause of that questioning because I did address the issue. I thank the Member for the question. Hon. Member, the total pool of buildings is 39 buildings. There are 22 in Trinidad and 17 in Tobago. The shortfall for all of the 22 buildings in Trinidad was 6.8 million roughly, and the total shortfall for the 17 buildings in Tobago was approximately \$782,000. So what happened was that there was a shortfall across all of the buildings because the total sum aggregated was insufficient. We knew it would have been insufficient. The hon. Minister of Finance indicated that upfront. So the total shortfall that we are looking at is spread across rental due for all buildings, and therefore, it is to be applied across all 39 of the buildings.

Mr. Hosein: All right. And it is arrears?

Hon. Al-Rawi: Yes.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you. That is all for me.

Question put and agreed.

Head 03 varied by an increase in the sum of \$35,195,944.

Madam Chairman: I thank you Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs. I thank you the Deputy Court Executive Administrator and the Director of Finance.

Head 17: Personnel Department \$8,640,671.

Madam Chairman: I would invite the Minister of Public Administration to make a brief opening statement for a maximum of five minutes.

Hon. West: Thank you, Madam Chair. Madam Chair, the Personnel Department is responsible for negotiating and agreeing on terms and conditions for the public service. The budget that was presented to the Ministry of Finance was contemplated in terms of the plans that they had for the financial year 2021. The allocation finally agreed in the budget fell short of that, and so the variation for which approval is being requested is to address that shortfall. Thank you, Madam Chair.

Question proposed: That Head 17 be varied by an increase in the sum of \$8,640,671.

Madam Chairman: Member for Barataria/San Juan.

Mr. Hosein: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. Minister, will you be so kind enough to give us a breakdown of the separate expenditures? Because I see under the explanation there is rental, there is renewal of software, janitorial, consultancy services. Can you just disaggregate that \$8.6 million into those categories?

Hon. West: Sure. There was an adjustment in respect of rental of accommodation; an adjustment in respect of other contracted services which largely had to do with a payment for a review of the Government health plan; there was an adjustment in respect of a licence fee that was payable; in respect to the PSIP Programme, there were adjustments in respect of job evaluations being conducted for the public service on the one hand, and on the other the SRC.

Mr. Hosein: Minister, can you give us the cost of each of those that you outlined?

Mr. Imbert: Madam Chairman –

Hon. West: So —
Mr. Imbert: Oh sorry.
Hon. West: Yes, go ahead.

Mr. Imbert: Madam Chairman, just let me add some clarification. The CPO in fact has a dual reporting relationship. The Personnel Department resides within the Minister of Public Administration. But, with respect to collective bargaining in terms of terms and conditions of employment of public servant, the CPO reports to the Ministry of Finance. The CPO is currently doing quite a lot of work for the Ministry of Finance, a job evaluation exercise and also looking at the health plan for the public servants.

So even though the allocation is within Public Administration and the line Minister is the Minister of Public Administration, there is that other relationship with the Ministry of Finance. And one of the reasons for the supplementation was for the cost of this job evaluation exercise where we had expected to have to supplement the appropriation in the amount of about \$8 million for the year where we ended up spending a little less. Okay? So I just wanted to give that clarification.

Madam Chairman: Okay. Minister, I believe there is a question.

Hon. West: Yes, Madam Chair. So the adjustments that were made were in respect of rent to start with. The allocation that was requested by the CPO in respect of rent was 7.6 million. The allocation that was received was 7 million. So there was an under-allocation of 600,000. But because the overall allocation included an under-allocation in respect of salaries and wages, there was a transfer during the course of the year from rental accommodation and other expenses to compensate to ensure that we pay public servants on time, both contract workers and permanent workers on the establishment, so this at the end of the year there was a shortfall that was in excess of the original \$600,000 shortfall and that amounted to \$2.192,433.

Mr. Hosein: 2.9?

Hon. West: 2,192,400.33. Yes? In respect of fees and these are fees for the licence, that was \$67,800;

Other Contracted Services was \$1,340,500.38; Janitorial Services, \$85,988 under Recurrent Expenditure.

2.30 p.m.

In respect of the PSIP, the job evaluation for the civil service \$4,953,912 and that is it.

Mr. Hosein: And the SRC.

Hon. West: Sorry?

Mr. Hosein: You said there were two PSIP. One for public and one for SRC.

Hon. West: The SRC, there was no payment in the end because the services were not provided in accordance with the terms of the contract so the payment was deferred to a later year when those services were delivered.

Mr. Hosein: Sure. Minister, can you give us what the total expenditure for rent/lease office accommodation would have been for 2021 with this variation?

Hon. West: Can you repeat the question, please?

Mr. Hosein: Can you give us what the total expenditure for rent/lease accommodation would have been for the year 2021 with this variation?

Hon. West: The total amount requested for rental or lease of accommodation was \$8,625,348.

Mr. Hosein: Okay.

Madam Chairman: No further questions?

Hon. Members, the question is that the 2021 appropriation for Head 17 Personnel Department be increased by the sum of \$8,640,671.

Question put.

Mr. Lee: Division please. **Madam Chairman:** On this?

Mr. Lee: [Inaudible]

Mr. Imbert: You want a division on this Head?

Madam Chairman: Okay, so Members, a division has been called for so that we will ask that we have the Members who are throughout the building to get here. We will wait for three minutes. So the three minutes starts now.

Madam Chairman: I will now invite the Minister of Finance to make a brief opening statement for a maximum of five minutes. Minister of Finance.

Hon. Imbert: Thank you very much, Madam Chairman. The write-offs are quite routine and quite standard. The write-off in the Auditor General's Department is for audit fees for previous years going way back to 1991 and 1993, and for audit fees for the THA from 2001 and 2009. These Departments, the Eric Williams Complex Authority and the THA, are all funded by Government, and therefore, even though the fees exist, we are asking for them to be written off because there is no point in them remaining on the books.

Similarly, Education, a situation arose where some teachers, 178 teachers were over paid as a result of implementation of a classification and compensation plan for the teaching service. Again, going way, way back to 1998 and 2002. I felt it was not fair to penalize these teachers by asking them to repay the moneys so we are asking for that to be written off, it is 20 years old.

And in the Ministry of Trade and Industry, again, eTeck is owed money by invesTT. Both of these entities are fully funded by the State. InvesTT in particular is fully reliant on Government subvention has no revenue stream to fund its operations. So that even though there is a debt on the books, eTeck's books that is, from invesTT there is no point really in addressing this matter by way of a subvention to invesTT and this goes back to the years 2014 to 2017. So we are asking for these three sums to be written off.

Question proposed: That the write-off of losses in the sum of \$1,498,666.01 for Head 02 be approved.

Question proposed: That the write-off of losses in the sum of \$1,330,656.74 for Head 26 be approved.

Question proposed: That the write-off of losses in the sum of \$5,389,331.66 for Head 48 be

approved.

Madam Chairman: Member for Oropouche West.

Mr. Tancoo: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just as a point of clarification, I note that in the script, the note to the Standing Finance Committee that at the start of it the Minister advised that the Committee was not convened in 2021 to consider these very same accounts. Can the Minister advise why the Committee was not convened in January 2021 so that we had to do this today?

Hon. Imbert: I think I referred to that earlier. There was no requirement to have a variation of appropriation in 2021, and therefore no opportunity to deal with write-offs so they were carried forward to this year and we are dealing with them now.

Question put and agreed to.

The write-off of losses in the sum of \$1,498,666.01 for Head 02 approved.

Question put and agreed to.

The write-off of losses in the sum of \$1,330,656.74 for Head 26 approved.

Savings were realized because the amount to be paid as Trinidad and Tobago's contribution to Caribbean Development Bank for 2020 was not finalized - \$12,213,242.

Continuous review of the Food Support Programme has resulted in a reduction in the number of persons meeting the qualifying criteria for food cards. This has resulted in a savings under the Programme - \$105,200,000.

The thorough scrutiny of applications submitted for the Salary Relief Grant ensured only applicants who satisfied the criteria received payment. As a result a balance was realized under the vote - \$233,000,000.

The Covid-19 pandemic led to a delay in the continued implementation of several projects under the Infrastructure Development Fund - \$113,000,000.

The principal repayment of \$400Mn which was due to be paid in fiscal 2020 on behalf of the National Maintenance Training and Security Company Ltd. has been re-scheduled for payment in fiscal 2028 - \$230,000,000.

The Covid-19 pandemic led to a delay in construction of the Terminal and Associated Facilities at the ANR Robinson International Airport - \$86,000,000.

To meet the cost of janitorial services to the end of fiscal 2021 - \$378,000.

To facilitate the acquisition of arms and ammunition for use by the Municipal Police - \$800,000.

Reasons for Savings

The Covid-19 Pandemic limited operations of the National Reforestation and Watershed Rehabilitation Programme in fiscal 2021- \$4,005,260.

Head 43 – Ministry of Works and Transport - \$31,861,851

Reasons for Transfer

To facilitate the payment of Wages and COLA to daily rated workers attached to the Maintenance Division to September 30, 2021 - \$9,535,225.

To pay TSTT for services provided - \$996,680.

To enable the acquisition of two (2) Trucks - \$625,290.

To meet the cost of the lease/rental of equipment utilized in the clearing, cleaning and desilting of rivers and other water courses - \$12,000,000.

To facilitate the acquisition of surveying equipment and related accessories -\$200,307.

To pay suppliers for goods and services provided to the Transport Division - \$1,504,349.

To meet expenditure incurred with the implementation of the Desilting Programme - \$7,000,000.

Reasons for Savings

Because all of the funding allocated for Goods and Services was not utilized, the balances under the following votes were available for transfer:

Materials and Supplies - \$189,690

Repairs and Maintenance – Building - \$200,207

• Other Contracted Services - \$435,600

Interruption of the Inter Island Ferry Service due to the Covid-19 Pandemic led to a reduction in the operational cost of the service - \$12,996,680.

The expenditure incurred by the Traffic Enforcement Unit was below the sum allocated for use in fiscal 2021 - \$1,504,349.

Since repayment on a NIDCO TT\$300Mn Fixed Loan was made under Head 18 – Ministry of Finance funding allocated to the Ministry of Works and Transport for that purpose became available for transfer - \$7,000,000.

Delays in the certification of bills which were received from three (3) projects under the Development Programme led to funds being available for transfer. - \$9,535,225.

Head 61 – Ministry of Housing and Urban Development - \$10,265,500

Reasons for Transfer

To facilitate payment for arrears of increment, salaries and allowances for fiscal 2021 - \$900,000.

To pay NIS contributions for the month of September 2021 - \$60,000.

To supplement funds allocated in fiscal 2021 to eight (8) sub-items under Goods and Services - \$9,305,500.

Reasons for Savings

After the Housing Development Corporation (HDC) paid the Principal and Interest on a \$650Mn. Term Loan Facility a balance was available for transfer - \$10,265,500.

Head 64 – Trinidad and Tobago Police Service - \$27,900,000

Reasons for Transfer

To enable the Trinidad and Tobago Police Service (TTPS) to pay Salaries and Cola for the month of September, 2021 - \$13,900,000.

To pay salaries to contract officers for the month of September, 2021 - \$2,000,000.

To facilitate the payment of rent - \$3,000,000.

To pay various service providers for repair works completed on police vehicles; buildings; as well as the servicing of air condition units and the sanitizing of various offices - \$6,000,000.

To meet costs for the renewal of software licences - \$3,000,000.

Reasons for Savings

Savings have been realized from two (2) projects under the Development Programme which were re-scheduled for implementation in fiscal 2022 - \$15,900,000.

The funding allocated for the acquisition of items of Other Minor Equipment was not fully utilized in fiscal 2021 thereby enabling the balance to be transferred to meet expenditure under Goods and Services - \$5,000,000.

The Covid-19 Pandemic led to the curtailment of activities which were scheduled for implementation under the following votes:

- Police Youth Clubs \$2,000,000
- Trinidad & Tobago Police Academy \$5,000,000

<u>Head 75 – Equal Opportunity Tribunal - \$178,500</u>

Reasons for Transfer

To meet expenditure incurred under three (3) Sub-items detailed hereunder:

• Salaries and COLA - \$159,700

• Government's Contribution to NIS - \$ 14,500

• Government's Contribution to Group Health

Insurance (Monthly paid officers) - \$ 4,300

Reasons for Savings

The funds allocated in fiscal 2021 to meet expenditure under Goods and Services were not fully utilized. As a result, savings from seven (7) votes were available for transfer - \$96,500.

Due to an administrative setback, the payment of contract gratuity was delayed to fiscal 2022 - \$82,000.

Head 77 – Ministry of Agriculture, Land and Fisheries - \$12,020,000

Reasons for Transfer

To facilitate the purchase of a tractor truck for use by the Ministry's Engineering Division - \$1,300,000.

To pay the National Agricultural Marketing and Development Corporation (NAMDEVCO) for the "Market Boxes" of fresh produce which were supplied to citizens

and permanent residents adversely affected by Coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic - \$3,000,000.

To settle travelling and subsistence claims brought forward from fiscal 2020 - \$3,708,160.

To facilitate the payment of bills received from TSTT and Flow for services provided over the period 2019 to 2020 - \$1,000,700.

To enable payment to be effected for security services provided during the period December 2019 – August 2020 - \$1,400,000.

Reasons for Savings

Savings were identified as contracts for the desilting of watercourses and road repair works were rescheduled for award in fiscal 2022 - \$1,300,000.

Because the expenditure under Salaries and Wages and COLA was less than the sum allocated in fiscal 2021, the remaining balances were available for transfer as detailed:

• Salaries and COLA - \$7,720,000

• Wages and COLA - \$3,000,000

Head 78 – Ministry of Social Development and Family Services - \$13,124,403

Reasons for Transfer

To facilitate the payment of salaries to contract officers to September 30, 2021 - \$7,000,000.

To meet remuneration costs to persons appointed to Committees and Boards - \$1,000,000.

To pay the National Maintenance, Training and Security Company Limited (NMTS) for security services provided from January 2019 to the end of fiscal 2021 - \$4,000,000.

To meet the cost of advertisements which were placed in the Trinidad Express, Newsday and Trinidad Guardian - \$500,000.

To pay Trinidad and Tobago Electricity Commission (T&TEC) for electricity services provided to the San Fernando Local Board—\$624,403.

Reasons for Savings

Because there were no major natural disasters in fiscal 2021, savings were realized from the funding allocated for that purpose - \$13,124,403.

Head 79 – Ministry of Sport and Community Development - \$6,500,000

Reasons for Transfer

To meet shortfalls in respect of funding allocated to the following Sub-items:

• Telephones - \$2,100,000

• Rent/Lease - \$1,500,000

• Janitorial Services - \$1,000,000

• Security Services -\$1,100,000

• Employee Assistance Programme - \$200,000

Reasons for Savings

Expenditure incurred due to the payment of Salaries and COLA was less than the funding allocated for that purpose in fiscal 2021 - \$4,500,000.

The Covid-19 Pandemic caused a reduction in number of grants and incentives issued in fiscal 2021 - \$2,000,000.

Head 80 – Ministry of Tourism, Culture and the Arts - \$980,000

Reasons for Transfer

To enable payments to be made under Personnel Expenditure as detailed:

• Salaries and COLA - \$900,000

• Wages and COLA - \$ 25,000

• Government's Contribution to NIS - \$ 55,000

Reasons for Savings

The Covid-19 Pandemic impacted negatively on marketing and other promotional activities in respect of Eco Tourism for fiscal 2021 - \$980,000.

Head 81 – Ministry of Youth Development and National Service - \$2,446,678

Reasons for Transfer

To meet rental costs to September 30, 2021 - \$1,155,678.

To facilitate the payment of Salaries to officers on contract - \$1,291,000.

Reasons for Savings

The Community Recovery Programme was at a developmental stage and therefore the programme could not have been implemented in fiscal 2021 - \$2,446,678.
